The Salvation Army Supports Manhunt For Killer In Southern California



Weldon, CA (August 8, 2015) - The Salvation Army will resume feeding operations in support of the law enforcement personnel engaged in a massive manhunt in eastern Kern County, about two hours north of Los Angeles. At least eight agencies – from county Sheriff's Departments to U.S. Marshalls – are staged near the community of Weldon and carefully searching a five-square mile area for a man suspected of murdering David Louis Markiewitz of Tehachapi and kidnapping three men near Jawbone Canyon.

Salvation Army volunteers from Lake Isabella and Mojave have been on scene with a Disaster Services Canteen (mobile kitchen) since Monday, at the request of the American Red Cross, providing meals, snacks, fruit and drinks to search personnel staged at two locations. As the number of agencies involved in the search has increased, the number of meals served by the

Salvation Army also increased from 100 to over 700 meals per day. As of Friday evening, a collective of 2,250 meals had been served by Salvation Army and Red Cross teams this week.

Today, American Red Cross will begin transitioning remaining operational responsibility to The Salvation Army. This means, The Salvation Army will assume responsibility for providing three meals per day and maintaining shelter/sleeping areas for search crews until the search operation ends. The 11-day search is required to move slowly, so officers can carefully search the rugged terrain, with abandoned mines, caves, rocks and sage brush. It is unknown how long it may take to locate and capture the suspect.

"It's a privilege to be able to serve alongside the law enforcement agencies working to find the suspect and restore calm to the local towns in the area," said John McKnight, Emergency Disaster Services Director for The Salvation Army's Golden State Division. "Whether a natural disaster, manmade disaster, or even a horrible tragedy like the community of Weldon has experienced, The Salvation Army is committed to serving as long as needed."

Texas Baptist Men Provide Specialized Water Filtration System To Texas EDS



Dallas, TX (August 4, 2015) – The Texas Baptist Men provided a new specialized filtering system for The Salvation Army water tanker. This system purifies water with a combination of UV Light and five different filters, which will allow The Salvation Army to provide filtered water to any disaster response resource. This cooperative effort illustrates the value of having strong partnerships during disaster and non-disaster times.

The Salvation Army Texas Division's 3,250 gallon water tanker, donated by the John Soules Food Co., is deployable to any municipality or jurisdiction in need of bulk water statewide.

Mississippi Hams To Commemorate Katrina 10th Anniversary With Special Event



Jackson, MS, TX (August 10, 2015) – A special event operation from August 26 through September 2 will commemorate the 10th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina which made landfall on August 29, 2005. It is being conducted to remember those who were impacted by Hurricane Katrina in Mississippi, including over 230 people who lost their lives.

"Many lost everything they owned and many lost their lives," said Larry Morgan, AG5Z, who is spearheading the event. "We also want to honor the hundreds of volunteers from all over the country that poured in to assist us in our time of dire need."

Several stations in cities and towns impacted by Hurricane Katrina will use special event K (for Katrina) prefix 1×1 call signs. The operation will begin on August 26 at 0000 UTC from home stations. On August 29 at 1300 — the time of Katrina's impact — all stations will reduce power to 100 W, except for bonus stations K5M and K5T. Reduced-power operation will continue until September 2 at 2359 UTC.

K5Z at "ground zero" will be a portable QRP station on the beach using temporary antennas and emergency power.

Morgan thanked the 599 DX Association and the Hattiesburg Amateur Radio Club for their coordinating this event.

Operators came from all over the United States to provide The Salvation Army with Health & Welfare and Situational Awareness / Tactical Communications support. A station was set up for a brief period of time at Divisional Headquarters for the Alabama-Louisiana-Mississippi Division in Jackson, MS. It was set up the office of Bill Feist, WB8BZH, who was the Divisional Emergency Disaster Services (EDSD) Director.

Another station was set up in a tent at Yankie Stadium in Biloxi, MS, which was the main staging area for all Salvation Army operation on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. The Salvation Army had just purchased the property three days before Katrina came ashore. Overall, SATERN received 60,000 Health & Welfare Inquiries and delivered 25,000 Health & Welfare messages. It also relayed numerous emergency messages from or about people who were stranded or in need of assistance, helping to save several lives. SATERN's contribution may

be recognized in an article about Hurricane Katrina in an upcoming issue of SOUTHERN SPIRIT, the official magazine of The Salvation Army for the Southern Territory.

The Salvation Army in Greece Offers Assistance to Refugees



International HQ (August 14, 2015) - The Salvation Army is providing a compassionate ministry to some of the thousands of refugees who have fled to Greece from north Africa and the Middle East. Up to 1,500 people are arriving every week at the Port of Pireas, Athens, with many setting up unofficial camps in the center of Athens.

Major Polis Pantelidis, from Athens Corps (church), has been supplying food parcels to people living rough in the parks, although this has proved difficult because the need is so great and he cannot take enough food for everyone.

Plans are in place to put together food parcels for people arriving at Pireas, to help them cope with the system of processing and registration that can take many hours. The provision of bread, food and

drink will also offer opportunities for conversations and, the Salvation Army team members hope, will take away some of the fear for people who have fled atrocities and now find themselves in a strange country with little or no support.

At the Athens Corps, children's activities are being run, attended mainly by young people who have recently come to Greece by boat. In a safe environment, they are given the opportunity to express their feelings and talk about their experiences through games and drawing. The activities are run by a group of up to 15 volunteers, with links being formed with other groups should more help be needed.

The Salvation Army will continue to do all it can to help the increasing number of refugees, though funding is proving difficult – especially as so many people in Greece are already facing hardship because of the economic crisis.

The Salvation Army Serving Myanmar Communities In National Flood Crisis



International HQ (August 2015) - Since Myanmar's rainy season commenced in early June, close to one million people have been affected by widespread flooding – compounded by Cyclone Komen – in 12 of the 14 states across the country. Considered some of the worst flooding experienced by the area in decades, nearly 100 people have died and 1.2 million acres of rice fields have been destroyed.

The Salvation Army is working alongside government and nongovernment organizations (NGO) to deliver relief assistance to the affected communities in the form of food, water, and shelter. Infrastructure damage remains a major concern as roads and bridges have been destroyed, and in some cases, swept away by the flooding. Many Salvation Army buildings and facilities are housing those who have lost their homes. Long-term relief efforts will revolve around funding and redevelopment of homes, toilets, and wells.
